Treasurer's Report

The IAF is registered as a charity with the Australian Charities and Not-for-profits Commission (ACNC) which allows us to receive tax deductible donations.

A full report for the Financial Year 2024-2025 was presented at the AGM held on 7 October 2025. Please get in touch if you would like to receive a copy.

The IAF revenue comes from members and friends attending fundraising events, supporting the raffles, paying membership fees and making donations. Nearly all funds raised go towards supporting emerging artists, a small amount is needed to cover the IAF operating costs. We thank all of you that support us.

In the financial year 2024-2025, the IAF gave \$40,704 in small grants and awards. Of this:

- \$38,704 was awarded in Small Grant awards, seven to individual artists and seven group awards
- \$1,000 – sponsorship of the Brighton Jetty Sculptures
- \$1,000 for the Adelaide Critics' Circle Innovation Award

The IAF had a very successful year.

Our membership numbers are now around 150 and we thank those of you who continue to support the IAF and artists through membership fees.

Donations

IAF Grant and Award Recipients

By Margaret Lynch: Chair Small Grants Subcommittee

This year, the South Australian Government released a 10-year State Cultural Policy¹ for the arts, culture and creative industries. One of the strategies identified in this document, titled *A Place to Create* is:

Thriving artists, makers and creatives

Making South Australia a world leader in supporting artists, makers and creatives to live and work at every stage of their careers.

The IAF Small Grants for Emerging Artists are contributing to this strategy and continue to provide increasingly needed and valued support for individuals and groups as they strive to further their artistic careers.

In 2025, we continued to support emerging artists through two rounds of grants. In June, \$18,704 was awarded to 12 individuals and 6 groups. In November, a further \$11,980 was awarded to 2 individuals and 2 groups, bringing the total funding distributed this year to \$30,684.

In 2024, grants totalling \$31,263.48 were awarded. The combined total for the past two years highlights the significant impact of the IAF Small Grants program and underscores the vital importance of our fundraising activities. We can only continue this level of support if the value of our fundraising efforts continues to grow.

The creativity, passion for, and commitment demonstrated by applicants in their proposals and final reports consistently confirm the value of the IAF Small Grants program. As these grants are entirely funded through fundraising, we encourage you to continue supporting these efforts and invite others to do the same.

Reports on projects from this year's grant recipients are published on our website as they are received. Reports from previous years are also available and make compelling reading.

Together, we can make a meaningful difference to the lives of emerging artists. A diverse and inclusive arts and cultural sector generates artistic, cultural, social and economic opportunities that strengthen social cohesion and enhance recognition of South Australia's identity on both the national and international stage.

Adelaide Critics Circle Awards - Independent Arts Foundation (SA) Award for Innovation



The IAF Award for Innovation, presented as part of the Adelaide Critics Circle Awards in December 2025, was awarded to Eleen Deprez and Michael Newall. The award recognised their project, *The Living Machine – Space for Contemporary Art*, for its innovative contribution to the contemporary arts landscape.

Jane Angel and Mary Odlum attended the Critics Circle Awards on December 8, 2025 at the Holden Street Theatres.

Peter Burdon, Chair of the Critics Circle accepted the award on behalf of The Living Machine Co-Directors, Eleen Deprez and Michael Newall. IAF received the following acceptance speech from Eleen Deprez and Michael Newall.



“We’re sorry we can’t be there in person tonight. We’re currently sequestered in the cold Belgian winter, quietly recharging as we prepare for a new exhibition program.

We’re deeply grateful for this award. Since 2023, we’ve been committed to building a program of exhibition, talks, events and performances that contribute meaningfully to Adelaide’s cultural landscape.

We started The Little Machine as a modest experiment; through the rent-free scheme Renew Adelaide we were able to lease a small space in Regent Arcade. We wanted to make exhibitions that we found fascinating, that otherwise wouldn’t happen in Adelaide, and to do so with an ethical and professional approach.

What started as a temporary, month-by-month project quickly expanded into something bigger. Since then, we have moved to a bigger space (still in Regent Arcade) have curated and mounted many exhibitions and events, working with scores of artists.

Our exhibitions and other projects – including artist talks, artist performances, lectures, an art-book and zine fair, and a reading group – have been driven by a desire to provide a scaffolding for artists and audiences to explore ideas vital to contemporary culture, linking them to broader cultural discourses within and beyond Adelaide. In the process, we have engaged with the tangled questions around identity and self, urgent social and political concerns, and our technological and natural environment.

Despite its name, The Little Machine isn’t cold or mechanical. It’s made of people: the two of us, the artists we collaborate with, the many friends who dig in to help, and the audiences who we have been happy to discover share so many of our fascinations and convictions. We are especially grateful to the artists who have worked with us: who have trusted us with unfinished ideas, fragile experiments, and ambitious visions. They are the heart of everything we do.

The Little Machine is a labour of love, and much of that labour is invisible. So this recognition truly means a great deal.

Thank you to the Independent Arts Foundation and everyone who has supported us, believed in us, and helped keep this little machine running.

Neil Curnow Award

The Neil Curnow Award is made possible through the generous bequest of the late Neil Curnow. Following his impressive career as an actor, director, teacher and voice coach, Neil made a bequest through the IAF to support emerging South Australian theatre people through this prestigious award.

The Neil Curnow Award is available to final-year students and graduates aged between 18 and 30. The purpose of the award is to support an emerging artist to undertake further study or career development in acting, theatre performance or theatre direction.

The award supports the recipient to undertake further study or an internship at a recognised institution, nationally or internationally.

Shardae is an artist driven by authenticity, rigour, and joy, moving fluidly across disciplines and embracing creativity wherever it leads.

As a recent Flinders University, Bachelor of Performance (Acting) Honours graduate, Shardae is motivated by telling stories that invigorate audiences and spark connection.

Her work includes the SASA award-winning *Guttercat* (directed by Aubrey Winslow), which was previewed at the Helpmann Academy Graduate Filmmaker Showcase 2025 and premiered at Adelaide Film Festival; *Odyseed* (directed by Kristoffer Lucia), winner of Best Film at Sydney Underground Film Festival's Take 48; and State Theatre Company Stateside show *Starweaver* (directed by Shannon Rush).

In 2026, Shardae will star in *B*tch Boxer* by Charlie Josephine for DEAD DARLING THEATRE and the Adelaide Fringe.

IAF Small Grant Recipient, Lucky Smith, Exhibition "Under 30's Eat Free"



The result was this award-winning community project, where 40 people shared the memories bound within the weft and warp of the fabrics they make or treasure.




Burt 'n Burke Special Literary Event, May 2025


Burt has also supported IAF since his Clare Valley winery days. His retirement saw IAF sampling his wines at several literary events.



Literary Dinner Report




We commenced the year on 18 February, with guest speaker John West-Sooby, a former Emeritus Professor of French at The University of Adelaide, talking about the book he edited and for which he contributed information on some topics, 'What have the French ever done for us?', a fascinating insight into the influence of French culture on our own in ways many of us would not have imagined.



Enrico Mercuri was guest speaker on 15 April to talk about translating Dante's Inferno into English, not from standard modern Italian, for which he was awarded a medal when studying at The University of Adelaide, but from the vernacular in which Dante wrote his Divine Comedy. Enrico was accompanied by David Blaiklock, the illustrator of the book, who created an illustration in every book purchased that night, to the delight of all who purchased a copy.

Tim Reeves, a historian and author, was guest speaker on 16 June, when he talked about his latest book, 'Adelaide Modernism: 101 Houses' and illustrated his comments with slides of relevant houses, which made guests aware of the architectural merits of these houses, many of which were recognised by guests as being in their neighbourhood.







On 15 July another historian and author and former history teacher, John Davis, was guest speaker to talk about his book, 'Harry Hodgetts - The flawed broker behind Don Bradman's move to Adelaide', which provides an insight into Adelaide society at the time when Don Bradman was becoming a household name and Harry Hodgetts was found to be a fraudster.

John illustrated his talk with informative slides about Harry Hodgetts and his fall from grace.

Andrew Roff, an author of speculative fiction, was guest speaker on 19 August to talk about his first published novel, 'Here are my Demands'. Guests were intrigued about the story and some also queried the meaning of 'speculative fiction'.

This was the second time Andrew has been a guest speaker, the first time being in 2022 when he talked about a collection of short stories which were published under the name, 'The Teeth of a Slow Machine' and which also provoked a lot of commentary.



Our Tuesday, 7 October dinner was held after the IAF AGM with a changed format - Samel Harris in conversation with Lyn Dickens, author of 'Salt Upon the Water', which Wakefield Press published this year after it was judged to be the best unpublished manuscript by a South Australian writer at the 2024 Adelaide Writers' Week.

Samela had familiarised herself with the story beforehand and was therefore able to conduct a very interesting and pertinent conversation with Lyn about her book, which is beautifully written and provides an evocative picture of life in colonial South Australia.





Our last dinner for this year was held on 18 November and I asked the two guest speakers, Peter Goers and John Roe, to give Christmas themed talks on any topic. They didn't disappoint, with Peter giving an entertaining, but also poignant, account of some of his Christmas memories, one being the last Christmas before his parents were killed in a plane crash. John, on the other hand, did a lot of research into the beginnings of Christianity and presented a fascinating account of the events and principle historical figures of the period, which kept us all spell-bound.



The 2025 literary dinners were again held in the Osmond Terrace Function Centre and I thank the Norwood Hotel staff for their collaboration in making the evenings possible.

Support for Adelaide Writers Week (AWW)

Many may not know that the IAF was a generous sponsor of Adelaide Writers Week (AWW) earlier this century. The Archive records the following memories from earlier days:

- The regular attendance of Neil Curnow, to witness the presentation of his annual award of \$10,000 to an emerging artist; in 2010, Russell Starke performed as MC, introducing each speaker, including the Chair, IAF who presented the cheque to the winner of the Neil Curnow Award.
- IAF sponsorship of \$5,000 for an overseas writer, was regularly provided to the Executive Producers of AWW. In 2006, our reward was to have sponsorship acknowledgment in the program, plus a free advertisement of the IAF Booklovers Breakfast, and complimentary breakfast for 30 writers;
- The very successful Booklovers Breakfasts were conducted in the grounds of Government House prior to the commencement of the interviewing of writers in the Pioneer Memorial Gardens.



Many of us remember enjoying the breakfast, with a writer present at each table. Organised expertly by a small Committee, the minutes in 2009 read that Vincent Burke was the Chair, ably supported by Marjorie Fitz-Gerald, Lynn Crosby, Judy Sinton, Sue Mintz, Lyn Hillier and Wendy Wauchope.



Many other contributors including current convenor of the Literary Evenings Cheryl Appelkamp de Valenzuela ensured the continued success of these events.

The efforts of the committee and convenors are remembered with gratitude.

Christmas Parties of past years



Marjorie Fitz-Gerald OAM- continuing champion of the IAF - regularly hosted a Christmas party at her Heathpool home. At these events, the Neil Curnow recipient would be a guest speaker, entertainment would be provided, and the awarding of any Honorary Life Memberships would be conducted. In 2012, the guest speaker was Ellonye Keniry with her presentation “*Shakespeare*”, Libby Donovan entertained with song, and the late Franz Kempf was presented with Honorary Life membership.
